married/Jessie Winslow Meeteer, daughter of Samuel Thomas and Mary Caroline Brayton Meeteer, born near Manteno, Ill., Apr 11, 1864. When she was thirteen, he parents moved to Kansas, where she later attended the normal course of Baker University. Atter/graphation, then taught school three years.

During Dr. Bliss' long period on the practive of medicine in Grinnell, they were active in Congregational Church work, withe Grinnell Humane Society. Mrs. Pliss, due to an attack of malarial rever in Kansas, her Mrs. Bliss' health was frail, yet she accomplished much in the good deeds and example. Dr. Bliss retired from active practice in 1937, and they spent two winters with their daughter, Esther Bliss Taylor in Oberlin. Ohio. During the second winter, Dr. Bliss died, Feby 26, 1939. Mrs. Bliss remained in Oberlin until spring, bringing his ashes for burial in Hazelwood. Mrs. Bliss spent much of her remaining years with the Taylors in Oberlin, where she died January 3, 1951.

The Bliss' had two children: Esther, Mrs. Lloyd Taylor of Oberlin, and Edwin Meeteer Bliss of Casper, Wyoming.

Mrs. Perish corresponded/with had written to Esther concerning a memorial gift to the museum. She and her daughter, Ruth Taylor Deery have sent a number of articles including the early Grinnell photograph of the Old Settler's reunion, an early photograph of the Searchlight Club to which Jessie Meeteer Bliss had been a member, an original Currier & Ives print framed print, a beautifully carved walnut picture frame.

Mrs. E. C. Bliss

Winslow Meeteer, of Samuel Thomas Jessie daughter and Mary Caroline Meeteer Brayton Meeteer, was born April 11, 1864, near Manteno, III. When she was thirteen years old the family moved to Kansas, where she later attended the normal course of Baker university for two years and pre-pared herself for her three

years of teaching.

Jan. 15, 1390, she was united in marriage with Dr. Edwin Clarence Bliss. Except for half a dozen years, all of their fortynine years together were spent in Grinnell, the birthplace of Dr. Bliss. Because of her frail health, due in part to the malarial fever of her Kansas days, and also because of a severe muscular weakness of her eyes, she had been unable to complete her education at Baker university. However she had a keen and inquiring mind and her children recall the pleasure of the long evenings when her husband read to her the books which in part satisfied her great

yearning for knowledge. In Grinnell she belonged to the Congregational church, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the Searchlight club and the Humane society. Her greatest activity outside her home was in connection with the Humane society and her personal efforts to protect suffering chil-

dren and animals. Her husband raid of her that she personi-ied the spirit of the Beatitude, Blessed are the Merciful." She vas a deeply religious woman and an ardent supporter of justice and the democratic prin-ciples of the American repub-

After Dr. Bliss retired from his practice of medicine in Grinnell he and Mrs. Bliss spent two winters with their daughter, Mrs. Lloyd Taylor in Oberlin, O. During the second winter Dr. Bliss died. Mrs. Bliss has made her home with her daughter since that time.

Mrs. Bliss died Jan. 3, 1951, after an illness of only three days. The funeral was held on Jan. 6, in charge of the Rev. Joseph F. King. Her ashes will later be interred in the family lot in Hazelwood cemetery.

She is survived by her daughter, Esther Taylor, of Oberlin, her son, Edwin Meeteer Bliss of Casper, Wyo., three grandchildren, Evelyn Bliss Reddin of Bowling Green, O., Ruth Taylor Deery of Longview, Wash., and two greatgranddaughters, Susan le and Linda Deery of Longview, d Wash.

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
