Death Calls Dr. Brainerd

One Of the Earliest Students in College Here Passes Away in Los Angeles,

WAS PROMINENT AUTHORITY
ON NERVOUS DISORDERS.

Dr. Brainerd Will Be Remembered As a Brother of Mrs. E. W. Clark.

Word received here from Los Angeles tells of the death there of Dr. Henry G. Brainerd, 76, one of the world's foremost authorities on mental and nervous disorders, who passed away at his home following an illness of five weeks.

More than fifty years ago Henry Brainerd was a student in college here, beginning his collegiate work with the class of 1873. He went from Iowa College, as the school then was known, to Dartmouth, where he was graduated in 1874, and then to the State University of Iowa, to take up medicine. He was there two years, and then went to Rush Medical College for his degree, in 1878.

Being attracted toward mental and nervous disorders as a field for his labors, Dr. Brainerd became superintendent of one of the state hospitals for the insane immediately following his graduation, and served in that capacity until 1886, when he moved to Los Angeles to become professor of mental and nervous diseases in the medical department of the University of Southern California. He remained in that chair until 1911, and was dean of the faculty from 1899 until 1902.

Dr. Brainerd was a native of Londonderry, N. H., where he was born May 23, 1852. He is survived by two sons, Henry H. and Fred L. Brainerd. His wife, whom he married in 1879, was Anna Loomis, of Manchester, and died in 1882. One son attended College here about a decade ago. The Doctor was a brother of Mrs. E. W. Clark.
