## Mrs. Thomas J. Bray.

Myma Evelyn Ryan was born at Colfax, Ia., and grew to womanhood there. She graduated from the Colfax high school, studied two years in Iowa College, studied voice culture in Chicago for two years and spent two years in the south in travel with her sister.

In 1892 she moved with her parents, Dr. and Mrs. J. R. Ryan, to Des Moines and made her home there until her marriage on June 18, 1907 to Mr. Thomas J. Bray of this city when she came with her husband to this city and did her part toward establishing a happy home on north Broad street.

Mrs. Bray was taken sick on the 19th of April and was taken to the home of her parents in Des Moines a week later. There everything was done for her that skill and loving hands could do, but all to no purpose. Her earthly life went out on the 17th of May, her death being caused by pernicious anaema.

Funeral services were conducted at the Catholic church at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon by the Rev. Father Mulvihill of Des Moines who performed her marriage ceremony less than a year before, the music being furnished by the Morning Musical Club of Des Moines of which she had been a charter member.
