## Michael Brooks

Michael (Mike) Brooks, 99, of 517 Eighth Ave. died Friday, Dec. 7, at his home.

Mr. Brooks served as a Washington Township trustee for four years and as a school director for six. He was also responsible for Lynnville and Searsboro telephone lines. He was a member of the Farm Bureau and a lifetime charter member of Focht-Tennant Post No. 53 of the American Legion, having served as vice commander. He served as commander of Hopeful Barracks of the Veterans of World War I for two years and served for over 20 years in the Veterans Ceremonial Unit.

Mr. Brooks was one of the last Grinnell World War I veterans.

Surviving are two daugh-

ters, Naomi Gerard of Brooklyn and Verleen Eggman of Grinnell; six grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren; and one sister, Esther Ehler of Kellogg. He was preceded in death by his wife; three sisters, Anna Kahl, Bertha Kling and Clara Balmer; and two brothers, Ernest and Albert Brooks.
