## George A. Brown

He majored in agricultural economics and animal husbandry and was elected to the Alpha Zeta and Gamma Sigma Delta honorary fraternities.

Mr. Brown was the first to contour land in Grant Township and farmed until 1956 when a congenital back problem necessitated a career change. He then became a consultant for the Cedar Valley Farm Business Association where he served for 26 years. He also served on the two-member committee which computerized the statewide Farm Business Association records.

Mr. Brown was a member of the United Church of Christ-Congregational, where he taught Sunday school. served as a member of the Religious Education Committee and was a member of the dia-conate. He was a member of the State Religious Education Committee which chose the site and began development of Pilgrim Heights Camp.

Mr. Brown was treasurer of the Poweshiek County Health Improvement Association and treasurer of the Poweshiek County Dairy Artificial Insemination Service when each was first organized. He was also a member of the Hermon Masonic Lodge and the Grin-

nell Rotary Club.

Survivors include his wife, Clara; two daughters, Nancy Wolff of Ames and Diane Harrington of Mount Vernon: two sons, Gregory and Douglas, both of Grinnell; six grandchildren; one sister, Marianna Duey of Waverly; and one brother, Stanley of Creston. He was preceded in death by his parents; one daughter, Judith Kay Brown; and a sister, Dorothy Sherman.
