Mrs. M. J. Brown Passes Away In Elgin, Neb.

Funeral services were held from the Presbyterian church in Elgin, Neb., Wednesday afternoon, March 2, for Mrs. M. J. Brown, who passed away Monday following a protracted illness. The funeral was in charge of Rev. David Scott and interment was in West Cedar Valley cemetery.
