Willis Everett Brown, son of Samuel and Sarah J. Brown was born on January 24th, 1877, on a farm north of Guernsey, Iowa. He was the second oldest son in a family of three brothers, one sister, and one half-sister. Two of these have preceded him in death. He was 76 years 7 months, 21 days of age.

Mr. Borwn attended the grade schools in Guernsey and graduated from High school in Brooklyn. He took post graduate work in the Grinnell High School and then attended Grinnell College.

On December 7, 1902 he was united in marriage to Vida Rose Keller of Deep River, Iowa. She was the loyal and loving mother in their home and to them were born nine children. Four of the children died when infants and the five others are living at the present time. Mrs. Brown died on December 4, 1951 here in Grinnell.
