Parke Buckley Was An Early Graduate

(From The Strawberry Point Press) Parke Buckley, zon of Franklin R. and Helen (Turner) Buckley was horn July 10, 1856 and died on the farm where he was torn in Lodomillo Township, Clayton County, Idwa, April 1st 1925, aged sixty-eight years, eight months and twenty-one days. His father and mother were among the early settlers of this community, coming here from Illinois in 1854 locating on the extensive tract of line farming land known as the Buckley farm three miles east of Strawberry Point which has been occupied by the family ever Rince. Here Mr. Buckley spent his entire life except when away from home attending college. He attended Upper Iowa university and Lenox college several terms and then entered Grinnell college taking a full

collegiate course, graduating in 1881.

In 1884 he took active management of the farm giving his undivided attention to farming ever since.
