Military Funeral 5793 For Dr. Butts

(From The Brooklyn Chronicle) Clifford Butts, son of William E. and Cora May Butts, was born in Brooklyn, Iowa, July 7, 1894, and died Friday, May 15, 1931, at the age of 36 years, 10 months and 8 days.

As the result of an auto accident last Sunday night he was taken to a hospital in Grinnell where he died Friday morning. He attended the Brooklyn schools, graduating from the high school with the class of 1914. Taking up the study of veterinary he attended Iowa State college at Ames from which he graduated with the class of 1918. Immediately following his graduation he enlisted in the veterinary corps. Most of his service was spent at Chattanooga, Tenn. Upon his return from the army in December, 1919, he began the practice of his pro-fession with Dr. Buffington in Brooklyn, and remained here until about a year and a half ago when he moved to Gladbrook for practice.

He leaves his father, mother and one sister, Mrs. Lena Reiche, of Brooklyn, besides numerous other relatives to mourn his death.

Dr. Butts was an outstanding veterinarian. During the years he was in this community he was recognized as among the best in his profession. The year and a half he spent in Gladbrook were surely well spent as is shown by the large number of people who held him in the highest regard. The interest of that community and their grief at his death was remarkable considering the short time he had lived there. Sixty-two drove over Sunday to attend the funeral, and to express condolences to the Butts family here.
