She has been in failing health since last December, though up and around the house every day up to June 8th.

On the 9th of June she was taken to Grinnell Community hospital for expert care. Though very loath to leave home, when settled at the hospital she was much pleased with the nurses and their efficient ministry, and expressed herself as glad that she was there.

Pneumonia setting in cut short the waiting period. She passed peacefully away Saturday, June 14 at 10:30 a. m.

Memorial services conducted by Dr. W. W. Bolt were held at the home, 1132 Main St. this mornig at

10 o'clock. Interment was in Iowa City, beside her parents.
