Mrs. Eva Card Is Mourned

Her Sudden Death Tuesday Morning
Takes One of Grinnell's Early
Settlers.

CAME HERE WITH HER
PARENTS IN DECEMBER, 1876.

Funeral Services Thursday Are Con-
ducted by Rev. E. M. Vittum
and Dr. W. W. Bolt.

The death of Mrs. Eva Mary Van-
derveer-Card quite suddenly Tuesday
morning removed from Grinnell one
of its early settlers. Born in Ports-
mouth, Ohio, December 30, 1867, she
came to Grinnell with her parents,
Mr. and Mrs. U. Vanderveer, in 1876,
and for fifty-four years this has
been her home.

She grew here into active and in-
teresting womanhood, and was re-
cognized by all who knew her as a
woman of great worth, modest, quiet
and helpful.

In February 1910 she was united
in marriage with C. J. Card, a well-
known successful business and sales-
man of Grinnell and and one of the
proprietors for many years of the
Card Shoe Store.

Her death occurred quite suddenly
at her home in Grinnell where she
had lived with her mother for sev-
eral years.

Relatives surviving her are three
sisters, Mrs. Lillian Batdorf and
Mrs. Anna Penfield of Grinnell and
Mrs. Ada Anthony of Haven. Her
mother also survives her and one
brother, Ralph Vanderveer of Mar-
shalltown.

Out of town friends attending the
funeral were Mrs. J. M. Fredrickson
of Estherville, Fred M. Card of Bur-
lington and son, Clayton, of the same
place, Mrs. Ruel Raines and son
Ruel of Kansas City.

Funeral services conducted by
the Rev. Edmund Vittum and Dr.
W. W. Bolt were held from the home
Thursday afternoon. Music was a
solo by Mrs. E. B. T. Spencer. Bear-
