CHAMBERLARS, the Gridnell, on Saturday morning, Mrs. Ella Fay. Chamberlain, wife of Rev. J. M. Chamberlain in the thirty-third year of her age.

Mrs. Chamberlain was a daughter of Dea. Pliny Vay, one of the first citizens of Muscatine now a resident of California and was born at Muscatine, April 24, 1845. From her carliest childhood she was distinguished by mesanal cheerfulness, gentleness, and amiability, traits which Christian experience and years of great suffering heightened and made more lovely. In her youth she vielded readily to the influences of one of the best of Christian homes, and a wise and faithful pastorate, and professing her faith in Christ, became a member of the Muscatine Congregational Church, (Rev. Dr. Robbins), She fulfilled faithfully the duties of a pasfor's wife at Eddyville, in 1867 8, and since then has resided in this town, universally esteemed and beloved. In October 1973, the lameness, which indicated scated disease, developed litself, and in January 1875, amputation of a limb became necessary to save, or at least, prolong her life. The suffering. confinement, and suspense incident upon this were borne with characteristic hopefulness and patience, as well as the steady inroads of disease, through the years since. At all times she received her Heavenly Father's will concerning her with quietness and trust and was ever to others, an "example of suffering affliction and of patience." Till the miduight before her death her great pain continued and the strength and restfulness of her faith fill the cud. She has left one daughter, a younger child baying gone before her some years since. And she has left a memory of kindness of heart which many young persons connected with the College who have been in her family, will ever cherish, and of beauty and consistency of Christian character which those who esteemed and loved her at Muscatine, Eddyville, and Grinnell, cannot forget.
