Allie Chedester Funeral Services Held Saturday

In the early years of their married life they operated cheese factories in several rural communities but soon settled down to farming. Mrs. Chedester joined the Episcopal church when a small girl and later the Methodist church in Grinnell where she was a member of the Woman's Society and Circle. She and her husband were charter members of the Westfield Grange and were instrumental in organizing Sonora Grange.

She was preceded in death by her husband, parents, five sisters and brothers, one grandson, a great grandson and a great granddaughter.
