Two years ago the couple was privileged to celebrate their Golden wedding anniversary.

Mrs. Cranston transfered her membership from the Baptist church to the Deep River Presbyterian church. She was active in all the activities of the church. She was a member of the Progress club and a charter member of the Sunshine Sisters and was their first president.

She is preceded in death by an infant son James William and a daughter Bonnibel Burns.

Besides her husband, she is survived by three sons, Cecil and Burdette of Deep River and Dean of Williamsburg, 10 grandchildren, three great granchildren, other relatives and many friends.
