ELMER CRIM DIES

Long Sickness Ends at Early Hour
This Morning at
Hospital.

MR. CRIM WAS VALUED EMPLOYE OF HERALD.

Funeral Services Will be Held Sunday at 4 P. M. at Mellott Parlors.

Death at 5:30 this morning put an end to the long and painful illness of Elmer Crim, who was forced to give up his work in the Herald plant a little over a month ago and since that time has been a patient sufferer at the St Francis hospital. Every attention was given him but his sickness was incurable. Death was caused by tumor on the brain

Mr. Crim came from Oskaloosa to Grinnell two years ago last May to accept a position with the Grinnell Register, remaining until last May, when his health necessitated a change of work and he came to the The Herald as extra linotype operator. He had worked only a few weeks when his condition became so serious that he was taken to the hospital.

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock at Mellott's Undertaking Parlor conducted by Rev. W. C. Wasser of the Methodist Church. The Masons will have charge of the service.

The body will be taken to Columbus Junction his boyhood home that evening and funeral services will be held there Monday.

Mr. Crim is survived by his wife and three daughters, Mrs. J. Frank Matthews of Oskaloosa, Rachel Crim of Des Moines and Velma of Grinnell.

Elmer was a good man and a good printer; devoted to the interests of his employer, faithful and competent. In its brief connection with him The Herald learned to value his services highly. He was only forty-six years old.
