

Heart Attack Fatal For W. E. Danovski

William E. Danovski, 63, a Brooklyn resident for 22 years, died suddenly at his home Sunday night following a heart attack.

Mr. Danovski, who had worked as a carpenter for several years, had been in poor health for the past two years and had been hospitalized intermittently at Veterans' hospital in Iowa City.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock at St. James Lutheran church in Victor in charge of the Rev. Edward H. Beckman. Organist was Mrs. Cloyd Lyman and vocalists were Mrs. Walter Stoker, Mrs. Edward Beckman and Mrs. Ralph Keller. Flower attendants were Mr. and Mrs. Carl Weiss.

Burial was in the I.O.O.F. cemetery at Victor where military rites were accorded by Francis Gallagher post of the American Legion. Serving as pallbearers were Roy Kriegel, Tom Leirmo, Mark Johnston, Cliff Williamson, Francis Chvala and Cecil Mitchell.

The son of Fred and Augusta Gutzun Danovski, he was born October 3, 1900, in Hamburg, Germany. In 1903 he came with his parents to the United States. The family came to the Victor community.

He attended St. John's school south of Victor. He was a member of St. John's church until 1917 when he transferred his membership to St. James Lutheran church.

He was married to Georgia Smith of Victor October 1, 1925. They lived in the Victor community until 1942 when they moved to Brooklyn. Mr. Danovski served in the navy during World Wars I and II. He was a member of the Francis Gallagher post of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

He is survived by his widow, Georgia, and six children. They are Mrs. Martin (Dorothy) Pilicer and George Danovski of Cedar Rapids, Mrs. Walter (Betty) Hanson of Miami, Fla., Mrs. Arthur (Thelma) Wittke of Mountain View, Calif., Fred Danovski of Great Lakes, Ill. and Jo Ann, at home. He also leaves his mother, Mrs. Fred Danovski,

and two brothers, Alfred and Walter.

He was preceded in death by his father in 1957; a brother, Harry, in 1943; an infant brother, Hans, and an infant sister, Gertrude.

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
