Brooklyn Rites Wednesday For Fred DeVilder, 43

Fred DeVilder, 43, Brooklyn area farmer, died suddenly at a local hospital Sunday, where he had been admitted only a short time before.

Funeral services were conducted from St. Patrick's church in Brooklyn Wednesday morning with the Rev. L. H. Mork officiating. In charge of flowers were Mrs. Fred Van Renterghem and Mrs. Camiel Van Tomme.
