"Tony" Dunton Dies Suddenly Friday Morning

Wayne "Tony" Dunton, age 47, of Grinnell, died suddenly early Friday morning at his home in Grinnell.

The son of Raymond Earl and Ethel Walford Dunton, he was born December 4, 1916, at Brooklyn, where he graduated from Brooklyn high school. On Oct. 23, 1941, he entered the service of the U. S.
