Cecil A. Elliott was born at Washington, Ind., October 3, 1878. She died at her late home at 715 Broad St., Grinnell, Iowa, on Friday, September 4, 1931. She and her mother Mrs. Mary Elliott had been engaged in the millinery business here for 28 years. Her father A. A. Elliott died a few years ago. Her brother Zibe B. Elliott died at Newport News, Va., while engaged in the service of his country before the Armistice was signed.

The Elliott family came to Grinnell to reside in 1880 when Cecil was an infant of two years. She spent her entire life here. She was a member of the Congregational church, of the Rebekah lodge and an enthusiastic member of the local Legion Auxiliary.
