DEATH OF MRS. ENSMINGER.

Mrs. Adaline Hanna Ensminger was born in Jackson Co., Indiana, December 19, 1829, and died at her home in this city, March 20, 1899, aged 69 years, 3 month and 2 days. She was united in marriage with George W. Ensminger, Oct. 28, 1849. Soon after their marriage they removed to Union City, Ohio, where they continued to reside till 1861, when they came west and located at Helena, this county. After spending a few years at this place they removed to Tama, and later to Grinnell where they resided from 1875 to 1894. Two years were then spent in Colorado and the same length of time in Illinois. In December last they came to Toledo that they might have their home with their daughters, now residing here. But the home so well planned for and that was looked forward to with such pleasing anticipations was not long to be enjoyed. To Mr. and Mrs. Ensminger were born eight children, seven of whom are living. Of these three sisters and a

brother were present on this occasion.

The others were detained from being here by reason of distance and affliction in their families.

Mrs. Ensminger was converted in 1863 under the labors of the Rev. Mr. Heiman, an evangelist of the Methodist Episcopal church, in the neighborhood of her early home in this county. For months past, while at times suffering very great pain, she was patient and uncomplaining. Recently when asked by an old friend and neighbor whether she realized that the Lord was near with her, she promptly responded, "yes, He is with me," and in so saying she seemed to be perfectly resigned to the divine will. The funeral services were conducted at the family residence in South Toledo by Rev. M. R. Drury, pastor of the United Brethren church, Wednesday morning, March 22nd, in the presence of a good number of sympathizing friends and neighbors. The interment took place at Helena, near the early home of the deceased in this county beside the remains of other members of the family.
