HON MATT EWART DIES

Stalwart Builder of Empire Passes
To the Great Beyoud.

YAS A PIONEER OF MA.

Matt Ewart was born in Morrow ounty, Ohio, in 1839. He came to oweshiek county in 1866, and with is brother, Robert, he owned nearly ve sections of Iowa soil in Pleasant The Ewart Brothers at wnship. ne time were the largest stock raisrs and feeders in the county, and the uilding of the G. & M. railway was great help to them and all Pleasant waship in the shipping of cattle nd produce. The Ewarts gave librally to secure the branch because ley knew the opportunities it would ring, and with their neighbors they rofited by it.

Matt Ewart was an active man, a pader and a thinker, a student of plitics and early gave his attention the advancement of the farmers almose and the greenback cause, beaving that more money would increase the value of farm produce and directly help the western farmer to aprove his condition.

Mr. Ewart was a prohibitionist in ractice and in principle and when the rohibition amendment was under ensideration in 1882 he not only faved it, but addressed meetings in the sunty supporting its passage. He as also greatly interested in polices and his advice was always sought members of his own party and folwed because they had confidence in is judgment.
