In 1959, tired of peddling honey, she returned to teaching, first at Lacey and then Montezuma. In 1965, she completed her bachelors degree at William Penn College, the same year her son, David, graduated from medical school, and daughter Linda from nurse's school. She continued to teach at

Montezuma for 16 years, totaling 26 years of teaching altogether.

She was a avid reader, studied world events and politics, and was knowledgeable about Cambodia, Vietnam and the rest of Indo-China long before they were in the popular press. She championed the cause of the underprivileged and oppressed, supporting Amnesty International, Klan Watch, and so forth. She opened her heart to students and befriended many who had few friends. She recycled long before it became the vogue.

She was financially conservative, and found it hard to travel unless there was an educational value. She attended world fairs, attending the 1933 Chicago fair, and others in Montreal, Seattle, Vancouver, Spokane and Knoxville. She and her hus-

band traveled to Alaska and Hawaii, and most of the other 48 states.

Mary was a 4-H leader for many years, a member of the Iowa Federation of Women's Clubs for over 50 years, and was active in the Garden Club and Literary

Club. She was very proud of her children, and enjoyed her grandchildren.
