Mr. Foster and his wife were also members of the Congregational church and both lived lives which exemplified fully the vows which they had taken.

He had been a member of the fire department for many years and was recently made chief to succeed Will Laymiller.

All his work in Grinnell has been of a high type and all of his associations with men in business, lodge, and society have been such as to commend him to all whom he met.

He leaves one daughter, Mrs. Emmett Hanger, of Shelbina, Missouri.
