Dwight Frazier Dies In Illinois

Dwight Frazier, 38 years old, and a former well known Grinnell citizen, died Saturday at the St. Joseph hospital at Elgin. Ill. Mr. Frazier, better known here as "Skinny," was a World War veteran, and moved to Grinnell shortly after the war. He was connected with the Grinnell Washing Machine Company, and then managed the Home Oil station. He married Anne Dennison of Grinnell, and in 1928 they moved to Chicago.

Recognized as one of the real heroes of the World War. Dwight Frazier was awarded the Croix De Guerre by the French government. He was badly shell-shocked in one skirmish in which all his gunmates were killed.

Since the war Mr. Frazier's health has been poor, and he spent many months in government hospitals. Last spring he was sent to the government hospital in Illinois, but after his condition became more serious he was taken to the St. Joseph hospital at Elgin, for special treatment.

Mr. Frazier was born in Marshalltown and attended the public schools and high school there. He is survived, besides his wife and little son Jimmie, by his parents Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Frazier of Marshalltown, a brother George and a sister Margaret. The body was brought to Marshalltown Sunday and the funeral services were held at 4 o'clock today. Among those attending from Grinnell were Mrs. J. S. McCuniff, Alice Dohrn, Mrs. Philip Streck, Daphne Streck and Mrs. James McCann.

Mr. Frazier was during his residence in Grinnell a member of the Focht-Tennant post of the American Legion and was also a member of the Masonic Lodge.
