

Mrs. J. W. Frizzell Passes

7-23-1935
Wife of Poweshiek County's State
Representative Dies At Her
Home In Brooklyn.

FUNERAL SERVICES ARE HELD SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Mrs. Frizzell Was a Woman Who
Was Loved and Honored by
All Who Knew Her.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, July 21, at 2:30 o'clock for Mrs. J. W. Frizzell who died Friday, July 19, following a long illness. The services were held from the Presbyterian church and were attended by more than a capacity assembly of friends from far and near.

Mrs. Frizzell was one of those rare and charming women who make friends wherever they go. She and Mr. Frizzell were widely known throughout the state in I. O. O. F. and political circles. During Mr. Frizzell's first term in the legislature and during the special session, Mrs. Frizzell was active in the social activities of the ladies of the legislature. During the last session she was in Des Moines, seeing some of her many friends there but failing health kept her from taking part in the activities. Since their return to Brooklyn Mrs. Frizzell's health had steadily grown worse until death claimed her Friday afternoon. Her devoted family have been with her as much as possible the past year during which time she was in poor health.

The community will greatly miss Mrs. Frizzell who has lived with us practically all of her life and whose influence has always been for the better things in life.

June, daughter of Dennis Cameron and Sarah Tinker Sleggel was born February 3rd, 1872, at Brooklyn, Iowa. Except three years which her family spent in Jacksboro, Texas, she has lived in this community.

On February 17, 1892, she was united in marriage with J. W. Frizzell locating on the farm west of Brooklyn which was their home until 1915 when they moved to the present home in Brooklyn. To this union were born two sons, Wayne and Thomas Lee who preceded his mother in death, and two daughters, Helen and Ruth.

Mrs. Frizzell passed away Friday afternoon, July 19, 1935, after a long illness which was accompanied with much suffering.

On December 22, 1907, she united with the First Presbyterian church of Brooklyn upon profession of her faith. She was always very willing to do any work assigned to her. For two years she assumed the arduous duties of president of the Ladies' Aid society and fulfilled her part in the work.

For nearly forty years she was a member of Deborah Rebekah Lodge No. 202 of Brooklyn, of which she was a Past Noble Grand. She was also a member of the Ladies' Auxiliary of Patriarch Militant. The Columbian Club of Brooklyn also claimed her membership.

She is survived by her husband, one son, Wayne, of Brooklyn, two daughters, Mrs. Frank Ritter of Grinnell and Mrs. Chas. Reading of Milford, one sister, Mrs. G. E. Binegar of Auburndale, Fla., two brothers, O. C. Sleggel of Auburndale, Fla., and Chas. Sleggel of Brooklyn, two granddaughters, Fern Frizzell of Brooklyn and Carma Frizzell of Rock Island, two grandsons, Dennis Cameron and Richard Frank Ritter of Grinnell.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 at the Presbyterian church conducted by the pastor, the Rev. E. W. F. Holler. Miss Thursia Manatt, presiding at the pipe organ, played "In the Garden," "Crossing the Bar" and "God Will Take Care of You."

Pallbearers were Frank Roberts, Ben Barber, Hugh Lang, Harry Bickford, Earl Brush and Alvin Johnston.

Interment was in Brooklyn I. O. O. F. cemetery, where the beautiful Rebekah service was given by Deborah Lodge No. 202.
