A Grinnell man was killed instantly early Sunday afternoon in a hunting accident northwest of Baxter in Marshall county.

Alone At Time

Victim was Edward C. Garlock, 52, of 1318 East Street, who was killed when his 12-gauge shotgun accidentally discharged while he was crawling thru a fence. Garlock was alone at the time.

According to Marshall County Sheriff Asa Landes, Garlock's body was discovered by a passing farmer. The farmer had passed the scene a few minutes earlier and at that time saw Garlock preparutes later and found the body.
