—George Graff was born in Eschbach, Germany, April 23, 1827, and died at his home in Sheridan, Nov. 1, 1899. He was a soldier in the Prussian Army in the Revolution in his native country in 1848 and was in active services three years. Receiving his discharge from the German army he came to the United States in 1854. He first worked on a farm near Philadelphia, thence came west to Cincinnati, to New Orleans and north into Illinois, settling on a farm in Henderson Co. From whence he went to Germany, returning with Miss Theresa Fiefgeld to whom he was married at St. Louis, April 1860. At the breaking out of the Civil War, Mr Graff enlisted from Henderson Co., Ill., in Co. K. 84th regiment, Illinois Volunteers, Aug. 8, 1862. He was transferred to the Veterans' Relief corps, Feb. 15, 1864, and was finally discharged in 1865. They moved from Illinois to Sheridan in 1871, and have been continuous residents since that time. To them were born four children; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Schiverdtfeger of Chicago, Ill., and three sons, Frank, deceased, Fred and George. The loving wife and three children are left to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and father. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Reinsch and the remains interred in Sheridan cemetery.
