J. B. Grinnell, Descendant Of Grinnell's Founder, Died on Wednesday

Josiah Bushnell Grinnell, veteran farmer who lived all his life on his farm north of Snow's Corner died Wednesday morning in a local hospital at the ago of 79 years. He would have passed his 80th birthday May 21. He never married. He had been ill for about three weeks. He had undergone surgery Tuesday morning.

Descendant of Founder

Mr. Grinnell was the son of Levi P. and Harriet Knight Grinnell. His father, a consin of J. B. Grinnell, who foun led this community, came to Grinnell in 1856, and build the residence at 1002 Paris street, acoss the street east from President Stevens' home. In 1862 he moved to the farm, which was then virgin country. J. E. Grinnell was born on May 21, 1872, while the family was living on the farm and spent afthis life there.

Survivors

He is survived by a sixter. Mrs. Harriett Grinnell Dunhaes, a niece. Marian Dunham, a depinew. Grinnell Dunham, the grand nieces and one grown rephew. A sixter, Lacy, dreft in 1879 and a brother, Waiter, in 1878, both of typhoid fever.

Mr. Grinnell graduated from Grinnell academy and then attended Grinnell college, graduating in 1894. He was a member of one of the earliest Grinnell football teams, and was a teammate of the late Dr. P. E. Somers and Dr. C. E. Harris. He played guard and is strift remembered for the anguished cry, "Grab loose that boit," which arose from the bottom of the pile during one hardfought game. He also was a baseball player of some note.

Enthusiastic Rooter

He never relinquished his laterest in college athletics and attended every college game which he could get to. He was an ardent enthusiast and his war cries of encouragement to the team would rise above even the most strident rooting. One of the football teams on which he played enjoyed the rare distinction of defeating the university of Minnesota.

Big and bluff, with a leoning head and a strong physique. "J. B." was another of the sterling characters who have helped to link Grinnell with the illustrious past. Although the younger generation did not know him well in his declining years, he will remain a first and vivid memory to the old

timers.
