Richard Gwin Dies; Home Near Victor

Richard Gwin, one of the oldest native-born residents of the community, died at his home southwest of Victor early Wednesday morning, following a stroke of apoplexy. He had been in failing health for a year.

Mr. Gwin was the third son of Sampson and Sarah Gwin and was born in the homestead on the old State road on Feb. 18, 1857. He had spent his entire life on the farm where he was born, being a farmer.

On June 20, 1896, he was united in marriage with Mrs. Lola Myrtle LaGrange, and this union was blessed with two daughters, Mrs. Harry Tuttle, who lives near the home place, and Alma Belle, who preceded him in leath some four years ago.

Besides his widow and daughter, a step-son, Hugh LaGrange of Grinnell, a step-daughter, Mrs. Kate Blood of Des Moines, five grandchildren and a brother, W. W. Gwin of Brooklyn and other relatives and friends are left to mourn his passing.

The funeral was held Friday at 1:30 from the home, conducted by Rev. O. E. McBride. Interment will be in the f. O. O. F. cemetery.—Victor Record.
