Mr. Hadley was a member of he Congregational church and leveral years ago was a member of the Board of Trustees of Wm. Penn College in Oskaloosa.

He was preceded in death by his parents, and by his wife. Minnie Boyd Hadley, on April 12, 1927. He was also preceded in death by his son, Dwight Hadley, one brother, O. J. Hadley, a sister, Celesta, and by a granddaughter. Elizabeth Fuller.

Elam J. Hadley. 92, former councilman and developer of Grinnell, died in a Washington. D.C., hospital Jan. 20th after a long illness.

Mr. Hadley developed Hadley addition along the east side of the Grinnell College campus in the first 20 years of the century and served on the city council

for some years.

He was also a trustee of Penn College in Oskaloosa for several years and was instrumental in planning Penn's present cam-pus and the residential development around it after fire destroyed the college's former building. He had lived in Wash-

ington since 1931.

He and his late wife, the former Minnie May Boyd, who died April 12, 1927, raised a family of eight children in Grinnell. Surviving children include Edmund viving children include Edmund E. and Donald B., both of Washington, D.C.: Harold and Mrs. Grace Faller, both of Marysville, Calif.: Herbert of Arlington, Va.: Mrs. Gladyz Barnes of Los Altos, Calif.; and Mrs. Dorothy Zeh of Winston Salem, N.C. Also surviving are two brothers. Riley J. of New Providence, Ia., and Jesse J. of North Platte, Nebr.: 14 grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.
The eldest son of Irvee and

Julia Jessup Hadley, he was born in the Richland community on Dec. 5th, 1870. When he was about three years of age. the family moved to a farm in Hardin county near Union. Of Quaker parentage, he was active in the Society of Friends for ---many years and also was a member of the First Congregational church in Grinnell where

his family attended.

His father attended Grinnell College in Civil War days and his mother in the 1880's. Mr. Hadley received his education in the old Friends Academy at Le-Grand and attended Eastman Business College in Poughkeepsie, N.Y.

Funeral services were held Thurdsav, Jan. 24th, from the Smith Funeral Home. Officiating were the Rev. Robert Dewey, pastor of the Congregational church, and Dr. Lloyd S. Cressman of William Penn College. Oskaloosa.
