Helpful Life Reaches Close

Mrs. Minnie May Boyd Hadley Passes
From Activities of This
Life.

FAMILY AND FRIENDS
REMEMBER HER TENDERLY.

Funeral Services Were Largely At-
tended Last Tuesday After-
noon.

Minnie May Boyd Hadley was born near Gilman, Iowa, March 26, 1874, and passed from her beautiful and active life near Grinnell, Iowa, April 10, 1927. Her mother died leaving her at the age of two. A younger sister died three years after the passing of their mother.

The years of childhood were spent largely under the care of two aunts, the Grandfather and Grandmother on a farm east of Gilman. Here she attended the country school and later continued her education with two years at LeGrand Academy, one year at Grinnell College and one year at Oberlin College.

On December 14th, 1893, Minnie Boyd was united in marriage with Elam J. Hadley and following their marriage they established their home first in Nebraska for a period of three years, then on a farm near Gilman for four years, and in the autumn of 1901 they came to Grinnell, where they have since resided.
