MRS. JESSE HAMOR. Mrs. Jesse Hamor died at her home near Grinnell April 22, after a long illness, starting with typhoid fever, and ending with tuberculosis. Mrs. Hamor was a bright, cheerful young woman, of winning manners, who never failed to make friends and who had formed a wide acquaintance among Grinnell people during her brief residence here. A service was held at the home Saturday, conducted by Rev. T. A. Dungan. The body was taken to Reinbeck for burial. The sympathy of many friends is extended to her bereaved husband.

The Reinbeck Courier, published at her former home, says:

The news was received last Friday morning that Mrs. Jesse Hamor had passed away at her home near Grinnell after a lingering illness from typhoid fever. The end was not unexpected and relatives had been summoned to her side, yet her death brought especial sadness to her relatives and friends.

As Jennie Cooper she had grown from childhood to womanhood in this community. She was born in Clinton county, Iowa, April 1, 1880, her parents coming to Reinbeck when she was about a year old and here nearly all her life has been spent. As a child she attended the public schools and later became a most efficient teacher in the schools in this vicinity and for a time in the fifth grade in town. On the 8th of August, 1906, she was married to Mr. Jesse Hamor and since then has made her home near Grinnell.

She was a faithful and consecrated member of the Congregational church where she had grown up into the christian life. Here in attendance, as a teacher in the Sabbath schools, as a member of the Christian Endeavor, she exemplified the beauty of a life of service. Hers was one of those winsome natures which do so much in home and public to make the Christ life attractive.

The funeral was held in the Congregational church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and was largely attended. The service was conducted by the pastor. The choir sang, "My Jesus As 1 nou Wilt," "My Heavenly Home," and The Christian's Good Night."

Besides her many friends she leaves of her own family to mourn her loss, her husband, her mother, Mrs. Emma Cooper, two sisters. Margaret and Emma, and two brothers, Albert and James, the former of Hawarden, Iowa.

It was a token of respect and sympathy worthy of mention that the senior and junior classes of the high school of which James and Emma are members, attended in a body accompanied by Superintendent Johnson.
