DEATH OF MRS. DR. BARRIS.

Another of the earliest response of the Grinnell, has just joined the response in the Unseen. Mrs. Dr. Racheell. Harris was numbered among the departed on Wednesday morning, the 28th inst., near the dawn of a new day.

From her earliest home in Washington, Pa., she came to Iowa serie thirty-six years ago, and to Grinnely two years later, with her husband, Dr. 1. H. Harris. Since then she has raided two years in Newton, one year in New York, as a student of medicine, and one year in New Orleans, sharing them a part of her husband's five years of medical and educational service during the foivil war. With these brief exceptions her home has been in Grinnell since 1851.

While in the south she effered the Freedmen's Bureau as a teacher in the Orphan's Asylum. She and he husband were specially interested in all those exslaves as they had long been interested in the slaves when such interest was not very common or very populity, when it cost something, indeed, to bikmown as an "abolitionist!" They secured a home here for Emma Morgan, and brought James Jenkins to Grinnell astrantages. Some will remember both of tiese.

Hers was a happy home, and she was the ever-present center of it love and cheerful service. The glow of her kindly presence was felt beyond her home, and especially in the sick-roop. It was a joy to many when she added medical knowledge to her other accomplishments, and thus united in herself, the good physician" and the good nurse.

Her last two years of physical sufferng brought out filial and family exhibitions of grateful love, as night brings out the stars. They have by ught her, too, consciously face to face with the next world. Looking on it this she has calmly made arrangements for leaving this, At the very last she becime aware of the hastening end and somed conscious well toward the close. Pirections for her comfort were hinted, good byes were uttered, a specially grate ul recog nition of the son who had been constant in the care of her helpless hough was giv en, and her soul passed on and up as the music of her favorite hymns was gently rising.

Formerly a member of the Congregational church, later of the Universalist, she passed out of life as she had passed through so much of it, resting calmly on the Christian's Rock. Her life has sweet, and beautiful, and useful; her death was like her life, worthily christian. * Dr. Rachel Hanlin Harris Died August 28, 1889
