## Last Services Held For Mrs. Floyd Hatcher

Funeral services for Mrs. Floyd Hatcher were held Thursday afternoon, October 10, at two o'clock from the Methodist church in charge of Rev. Charles R. Rowe. Prof. Elias Blum played an organ number. The pall bearers were Ed Speth, Guy Gorsuch, J. C. Martin, Pearl Niswander, Harry Bitcon and A. C. Barker. The Pythian Sisters had charge of the services at the grave in Hazelwood.

Lucille G. Muckler was born at Toledo, Iowa, on August 7th. 1895, and died at her home in Grinnell on October 8th. 1935, aged 40 years, 2 months and 1 day. Her childhood days were spent in Toledo until the fall of 1910, moving with her parents to Marshalltown, Iowa, later to Atlantic, Iowa, where she graduated from the Atlantic High School in 1914.

She moved with her parents to Oskaloosa, Iowa, in the summer of 1914 where she attended Penn School of Commerce and graduated in 1915. She worked as secretary to Attorney W. H. Keating and later joined the News staff of the Oskaloosa Daily Herald.

On January 22nd, 1917, she was married to G. F. Hatcher, whom she met while attending Penn School of Commerce. They moved to Grinnell, Iowa, on June 13th, 1917, where they have made their home up to the time of her death.

She was a member of the Methodist church, Home and Foreign Missionary Societies, Legion Auxiliary, Pythian Sister Lodge and past president of the Cooper Parent Teacher Association. She was an active worker in these organizations and gave a great deal of her time with them which she enjoyed. She had gone through Officers' Chairs of the Pythian Sisters and was a Past Most Excellent Chief. She will be missed by these organizations as well as in her home for her untiring work.

She leaves to mourn her departure, two children, Betty Jean, age 15, Roy Gilbert age 7, her husband. G. F. Hatcher, her father, Eugene Muckler of Oskaloosa, Iowa, and one brother D. J. Muckler, of Grinnell, Iowa., besides a host of relatives and friends. Her mother passed away on September 9th, 1919.
