Joseph Hays was born near Taney Town, Carroll Co., Md., Nov. 1, 1805, and departed this life at the home of his son, D. F. Hays, near Chester Center, Chester twp. Poweshiek County, Iowa, Feb. 17, 1899. He was married to Elizabeth Fues, May 2, 1833, with whom he lived happily until her death, Jan. 4, 1846. Four children were born to them viz: Daniel F., Deborah, Joseph T., and Thos. H. In the year 1856 he started with his children for the far west, as Iowa was then called. They landed in Grinnell Oct. 4th, 1856, where he resided until April 19, 1858, when he brought his little family to the place now occupied by his son; here he made his home until his death. This was the third residence occupied which is yet standing in Chester township. Here, Dec. 2, 1858, the daughter passed to the land of the blest. The three boys are still living, and now mourn the loss of a kind father.
