MRS. GEORGE W. HOOVER. Mary Ann Witters was born in Bath Valley, Pa., October 15, 1813, and moved with her parent to Blair County, Pa., when a little girl, and was there married to George W. Hoover. Then they went to Clearfield County, Pa, and there commenced life at Mt. Pleasant, continuing to live in Clearfield and Cambridge counties till twelve children blessed their union-five sons and seven daughters In November, 1868, they moved to Iowa.
