

Heart Attack Claims Huedephol

Funeral services were held at St. James Lutheran Church in Victor Saturday afternoon for Edmund G. Huedephol, 63, long time Brooklyn area resident who died early Thursday morning.

Death was attributed to a heart attack. He had been in good health until the attack.

Rev. Edmand Weiss officiated at the services and burial was in the I.O.O.F. cemetery at Victor. Casket bearers were Ralph Huedephol, Otto Maas, Maurice Seye, Louis Hahn, Robert Williams, and Leffert McIlrath. Music was provided by Jane McHarg, organist.

Mr. Huedephol, son of Herman and Anna Maas Huedephol, was born Aug. 3, 1905, in Hilton township, Iowa county. He received his education in the parochial Emmanuel school. He was baptized Sept. 17, 1905 and confirmed May 4, 1919 in the Emmanuel Lutheran church.

On June 28, 1928 he was married to Lydia Greif of Williamsburg. After their marriage they farmed in Hilton township until 1940 when they moved to a farm south of Brooklyn where they made their home until 1961 when they moved into Brooklyn. Mr. Huedephol had been active in farm work and had gone to the farm nearly every day since moving into Brooklyn.
