## Former Mayor Hotchkin dies

John L. Hotchkin, 78, former mayor, city clerk and member of the Grinnell City Council, died Wednesday evening, <u>Dec.</u> 5, at his home. He had been in failing health the past six months.

He was a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church and the Grinnell Elks Lodge and was a charter member and trustee of the Grinnell Eagles Lodge.

Mr. Hotchkin was married to Florence Cutler on May 17. 1929, in Des Moines.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Michael of Grinnell, four grandchildren; one great-granddaughter; and two sisters, Lucille Ashing of Des Moines and Dorothy Proctor Stepp of Kellogg.

He was preceded in death by an infant son, John; his parents; two brothers, Joseph and Gerald; and one sister, Helen Badger.
