## Harry Huff, 83, Former Pioneer Coach, Succumbs

Harry J. Huff, 83. Grinnell College athletic director and track coach from 1912 through 1926, died of a heart attack in Kansas City, Mo., Friday night.

Huff was to have received a Grinnell College Alumni Association award Saturday as part of the college's 1964 commencement week program. The award will be given posthumously.

Huff, who was born in Van Buren County, Iowa, was n member of the United State's 1908 Olympic team.

A sprinter, he won he 100 yard tash and 220-yard dash at the Glympic tryouts, setting a world's resond of 1.3 seconds in the 100-yard dash.

Though hampered by a consinad ankle and but sold, to placed riss in his pre-immore mens in both he 100-meter and 200meter dashes at the Olympica. But he was eliminated in the semifinals.

During his 14 years as Pioneer track mentor. Hurr coached some of the rinest athietis in the rollege's history. Included were:

Chuck How. a national col-

legiate formt shampion.
Cari F. Haas, winner of the first 100-yard dash event at the Drake Relays and a member of the U.S. team at the Pershing Olympics in Paris shortly after World War I.

Leonard Paulu, a national sprint champion who still holds the Grinnell College record in the 100-yard dash.

Morgan Taylor, the only trackman to place in three Olympics in the same event. Taylor won the 400-meter hurdles in the 1924 Olympics, setting a world's record. He placed second in the same event in the 1928 Olympics, and still holds the Grinnell College record in the 120-yard high hurdles and 220-yard low hurdles.

After leaving Grinneil at the close of the 1926 season, Huff served as head track coach at Kansas University for three years and at the Missouri University six years.
