## Eden Hunt Is Buried At Lynnville 7-1-1-75

Eden Hunt, son of Abraham and Mahala Dever Hunt, was born in Guernsey county, Ohio. Oct. 5th, 1837. The family came west in 1847 and located at Oskaloosa, Mahaska county. Here his father owned a wagon and carriage factory and here his son grew to manhood and learned his trade of a blacksmith. When the war broke out he with his younger brother enlisted in Company C, 15th Iowa and served until he was mustered out at the close of the war. Mr. Hunt was wounded twice, once at the battle of Atlanta, another time at the siege of Vicksburg. His entering the battle of Atlanta is quite an interesting little story. He was working at his trade of a blacksmith when General McPherson sent his orderly with his horse to be shod.
