OBITUARY.

Lucille Daly Jackman.

To have lived practically all one's life of nearly sixty years in Poweshiek county, entitles one to be called a pioneer. Lucille Daly Jackman who was buried in Hazelwood, Sunday was born in this county at Montezuma, September 5, 1857, and until eight years ago she was a resident of Poweshiek. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. M. Daly.

In early life she spent some years in Grinnell. She went to school here and taught school one year. She was married in 1883 to Charles B. Jackman and they lived twenty years in Union township. One son Charles B., was born to this union, now a practicing physician at Sherrake, Mich. In 1903 the family moved to Grinnell where Mr. Jackman died in 1904. It had been designed that the son Charles should attend college and graduate here, but the death of his father changed the plans and after attending high school and college a short time the young man engaged in other work, completing a course in medicine and surgery in 1911.

Mrs. Jackman made Grinnell her home until 1909 when she went to Chicago, where she lived until her death. On January 27 she was stricken with pneumonia and was taken to the University hospital where she died February 8, 1917, at 7:10 p. m., at the age of 59 years, 5 months and 3 days. She was a member of the Lady Washington Chapter O. E. S. and the funeral Sunday was in charge jointly of the Eastern Star and the Masonic lodge. Services were conducted by Rev. E. W. Cross.

Mrs. Jackman became a member of the Congregational church here in 1905 and was recognized as a woman of strong character, of ex-

Besides her son, Dr. Charles B. Jackman, she leaves two sisters, Margaret A. Wells of Montezuma, and Lillian M. Link of Elgin, Neb., and four brothers, M. S. Daly of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, Dr. J. F. Daly, Wisner, Neb., Oliver F. Daly, Firstview, Colo., and Chas. F. Daly, of Hamilton, Mont.

The body was accompanied to Grinnell by the son, Dr. Jackman and Wm. Armstrong of Chicago.

Dr. Jackman left Sunday night for Oskaloosa and returns at once to Sherrake, Mich., where he is surgeon for the Bartlett Lumber Co., and a number of other concerns in the vicinity. He is also in charge of the hospital.

Dr. Jackman also is a member of the Odd Fellows lodge, the Knights of Pythias and the Elks and is a 32d degree Mason.

Dr. Jackman and the other relatives ask us to tender their thanks to the local lodges—the Eastern Star, the Masons, the Elks and all others who gave assistance at the funeral, and gave flowers and in other ways expressed their sympathy and helpfulness.
