> Johnson died almost instantly and his body was so tangled in the debris of the wrecked automobile that partions of the car had to be cut away before the body could be removed.

Noticed Wreckage

Guy Slaven of Grinnell passed the scene of the crash short ly after it happened and noticed the wreckage. After hurriedly examining the car, Slaven notified authorities who came inmediately.

The Jasper county coroner examined Johnson and pronounced him dead. A later examination indicated crushing chest injuries and a basal skull fracture as the causes of death. Meanwhile, O'Hara was rushed to a Grinnell hospital for treatment.

Three Children

Johnson was married to Lela Van Meter of Grinnell on February 11th, 1956 and they were the parents of three children; two daughters, Sherry and Susan, and a son, Paul. -

Surviving besides his wife and children are his parents, George and Wilma Johnson, two sisters, Patricia Ann and Kathryn, and a brother, Russell.

Air Force Veteran

Johnson had lived in Grinnell all of his life with the exception of three and one-half years spent in the United States Air Force. While in service, he served in England.

Following his discharge in 1954, he had been employed at the Maytag Company in Newton. He was a member of the Methodist church and the American Legion.
