Brooklyn. The couple had seven children.

In the early 1920s, Mr. Lang operated a hatchery in Madison Township and was also associated with the Hendrickson and Lang Brothers Hampshire Enterprises,

Mr. and Mrs. Lang moved to a farm east of Grinnell in 1933 and started Lang's Dairy. During the 1930s and 1940s, the Lang family was well known throughout the country for the champion Ayrshire dairy cattle which the Langs bred. groomed and showed at local, state and national fairs.

On Jan. 29, 1950, Lloyd Cunningham, NBC broadcaster, presented Mr. Lang with the Agricultural Achievement Award on behalf of the Skelly Oil Company. In the fall of 1952, the Lang family sold the dairy and started the farming and dehydrating operation now known as Lang Farms, Inc.

Mr. Lang was married to Jennie Nichols of Grinnell on Oct. 4, 1959. He was a member of the Grinnell Kiwanis Club and the Grinnell Chamber of Commerce. He served on the board of directors of Central Christian Church and was treasurer of the Iowa Christian Evangelical Mission.

Survivors include his wife Jennie; his children, Mrs. Don (Kathryn) Larsen, James B. Lang, Eugene R. Lang, Mrs. Grace Davidson, and John R.
