Lewis Rasmus Larsen was born January 23, 1873, in Riske, near Stavanger, Norway. In infancy he was baptized and at the age of fourteen was confirmed in the Lutheran faith. At the age of 20 he left his home in Norway and came to America. He worked in the neighborhood of Sheridan for ten years, then he returned to his old home for a visit, after which he returned and engaged in farming on the Charles Mehlin farm.

He was united in marriage on Feb. 17, 1906 to Elida Thoreson. Four years later they moved to a farm north of Grinnell, where he has resided until his death. To this union were born ten children, Ralph, Carl, Mrs. Louise Wichman, Thelma, Esther, Lloyd, Doris, Robert, Donald and Roger Larsen. The happiness of this marriage remained undisturbed until his death May 29, 1935 at 7:40 a. m., after an illness of one week. He had reached the age of sixty-two years, four months and five days.

He was the oldest son of Rasmus and Inger Larsen, who preceded him in death, his father on July 30, 1904, and his mother on September 2, 1934. He was a kind husband, loving father, and was respected by those who knew him.
