## Mrs. John Lemke Fatally Injured

(By a Staff Correspondent) Kellogg, Ia., April 19, Special: Mrs. J. C. Lemke, resident of Kellogg for the past twenty years lied Saturday evening from injuries sustained in an auto accident about three miles west of town on U. S. highway No. 6. A passing car side-swiped the Lemke car, throwing it into a ditch where it overturned. Mrs. Lemke was able to walk from the car to a nearby house where she lay down for a time and then said she felt as if she could go on to her home. She died as the car drew up in front of a doctor's office here and a post mortem examination revealed the cause as a rupture of the arotia, due to shock. Mrs. Lemke had been suffering from heart trouble and high blood pressure for some time.

Funeral services were held at the home Tuesday afternoon with Rev. A. H. Schultz of State Centerin charge, assisted by Rev. W. G. Weber of the local Lutheran church. Burial was made in Our Silent City.

Surviving relatives include her husband J. C. Lemke, one sister, and four brothers. Mr. Lemke escaped with a sprained shoulder and a few other minor bruises. A passing motorist secured the number of the car and it was found to belong to H. C. Soults of Des Moines who was located at Reinbeck, at the home of a brother. Mr. Soults' car was turned completely around and he immediately disappeared from the scene going back west, the direction from which he was coming when the accident occurred.

Mr. Soults was to have been arraigned Monday at Newton before Justice of the Peace E. D. Finch on a charge of failure to report an accident.
