November 10, 1937 Elizabeth Swanson Lincoln, only daughter of Robert and Christina S. Lincoln, was born December 23, 1894, on the farm west of Oak Grove, and passed away Wednesday, November 10, 1937, following a brief illness. She was the fourth child to gladden their home. There she lived with her parents and brothers until the fall of 1910 when the family moved to Grinnell. She entered the Grinnell schools and was graduated from high school with the class of 1914. She attended Grinnell College the following year.

On June 16, 1915, she was united in marriage with Jesse Lord. They moved immediately to their farm home south of Grinnell and their entire married life has been spent in the Westfield community. To this union three sons were born—Charles, who was graduated from high school in June of this year, Alfred, now in the freshman class of the high school, and Howard in the eighth grade.

Elizabeth, as she was familiarly known, was a birthright member of the Friends Meeting at Oak Grove where her father served as pastor for many years. She was converted at the age of ten and was active in the work of the church. When the family moved to Grinnell she moved her membership to the Grinnell Friends Meeting where it has since remained. Although a Friend by preference, she has given many years of devoted service to the community church at Westfield where she and her family have been faithful in attendance. Here she has served in many capacities—as teacher, as pianist, as member of the social committee, as president of the Ladies Aid, and in whatever weys she could. At the time of her death she was serving as Chairman of the Social Committee and had planned and helped with a social just a few days ago,

Soon after her marriage, Elizabeth joined the Westfield Grange. and in it she has been a faithful and active member. She has held various offices, and has often served as Lecturer to which difficult task she gave generously of her time and interest. She was recently reelected as Secretary, which position she has held for some time. She has also rendered helpful service in the County and State Granges where she often filled some office. For a number of years she has been a

loyal member of the W. C. T. U. i of Grinnell.

Elizabeth was never too busy to help in community work and her death comes as a shock to all who knew her. Although she had been suffering from a bronchial cold for several weeks her condition had not been considered serious and she was able to come to Grinnell for treatment Wednesday morning. She had planned to return to her home later in the day but grew suddenly worse so was taken to the home of her parents where the end came about nine o'clock that evening. With her at the time were her husband and children, her parents, and others near to her.

Her home has been an open door to her many friends and relatives who will remember with appreciation her friendry hospitality. She will be missed most in her home where she was ever a loving and devoted wife and mother. Her children's interests were her interests and she was tireless in her efforts to make her home a happy place. She will be greatly missed by her parents to whom she has always been a devoted daughter, and by the many others to whom she has given so much of her time and interest, but her radiant spirit will live on in the lives of others.
