While there Grinnell people were delighted and surprised to hear his voice on the Vox Populi program being broadcast from downtown New York.

This fall his condition became worse and he had been bedfast since early September. While in bed his cheerful attitude made his suffering easier. His constant faith in the hope that he would some day be well again made those around him realize that he would put up a gallant fight to the end. During one of his worst s spells, a visit from his sister in r New York seemed to strengthen his faith and his condition seemed somewhat improved for a time.

Friday night he seemed worse and Saturday and Sunday his suffering at times seemed more than he could endure. At times Sunday night he was conscious and early this morning he slipped peacefully away.

Junior would have been a sophomore in Grinnell High school this fall had he been able to attend school. While his health permitted him to do so, he worked in Candyland at the fountain and all patrons learned to welcome his cheery smile and hello.

He was born on December 21. 1921, having almost reached the age of 16. He is survived by his parents, one sister, Phyllis, three brothers. Roger, Lyle and Larry.

Funeral arrangements have not been made pending word from Junior's sister Phyllis in New York.
