George Luffey rites Monday

He is survived by his two children. Francis Wilder of Grinnell and Jerry T. Luffey of Los Angeles, Calif.; five grandchildren; nine greatgrandchildren; two brothers, Joseph and Leo of Delano; and three sisters, Rose Blackfelner of Minneapolis and Julia Johnson and Gertrude Gardner, both of Delano.

He was preceded in death by his wife; his parents; four sisters. Elizabeth Rogers, Anna Hutter, Marie Eckerman and Agnes Wilkins; and one brother, William.
