John Lunn Is 81-24 Summoned By Death

John Lunn Sr., died Tuesday at the home of his sister, Mrs. William Ditzler after several months illness. He was a kind father, a good husband, and a considerate friend.

John Louis Henry Lunn, was born April 8, 1871 at Lynnville, Iowa, to Richard and Ruth Ann Lunn, and died July 29, 1924 at Grinnell, aged 53 years, 3 months, 21 days.

He grew up in the Sonora neighborhood. On April 5, 1896, at Brooklyn, Ia., he was united in marriage to Rebecca Rose McGinn of Searsboro. To this union were born two children, John and James, both of whom are living. He lived in Sonora for 10 years after his marriage, and for the last eighteen years has made his home at Searsboro.

Ailing for nearly a year he has been confined to his bed for over two months.

He is survived by his wife and two children and three sisters, Mrs. J. C. Whitted of Atkinson, Ill., Mrs. William Ditzler of Grinnell, and Mrs. Anna Carl of Grinnell.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Thursday at the home of his sister, Mrs. William Ditzler, where he had been cared for during his last illness, conducted by Rev. Charles A. Carman, pastor of the Baptist church. Interment was in Hazelwood cemetery at Grinnell.
