

# GALLANT AND DEVOTED LIFE REACHES CLOSE

Mrs. Lulu Eichhorn Lunt Passed  
Away Monday After Short Ill-  
ness.

HAD CONDUCTED FARM  
AFTER HUSBAND'S DEATH.

Is Mourned by Five Small Children and  
many Relatives and  
Friends.

A singularly gallant and devoted life came quickly to a close Monday afternoon, when Mrs. Lulu Eichhorn Lunt passed away after an acute illness of only three days duration. The daughter of Martin and Hattie Mintle Eichhorn, she was born on a farm north of Malcom, November 2, 1888. Her entire life was spent in Grinnell and vicinity. After finishing the work of the country schools, she came to Grinnell to attend high school and showed herself an alert and capable student. Although she did not graduate from high school, she learned to place a high value on education. This was shown in later years by her determination that her children should have the best of educational advantages.

On November 8, 1907 she was married to Andrew Lunt. They both had fine ideals of home life and the years of their married life were unusually happy years. By industry and efficient management they made good progress toward acquiring a farm home of their own. The children who came to them filled the passing days with happiness and brightened the future with promise. Seven children were born, five of whom are now living. These are, in order of their age, Shirley, Helen, Eleanor, Roger and Andrew Jr.

On February 27, 1922 after a brief illness, the husband and father was taken away. Mrs. Lunt, with the courage and resourcefulness that was characteristic of her, then under-

took to keep her family together at the farm home. In this brave effort, she received the generous assistance of the members of her family and of many neighbors and friends. Her success in her effort called forth the admiration of us all. She sought the best and highest for her children often bringing the family to Sunday School on a winter's morning when others found excuses for remaining at home.

When she learned that she could not live, she quietly accepted the Providence and amid much pain gave her whole thought to making final plans and dispositions in behalf of her little ones.

She is survived by her parents, her three brothers, Floyd, Garland, and Shirley, and by her five children. Her life challenges us all to live braver, truer lives. Her thirty-five years brought her rich experience of love and creation with their consequent deep joys. She crowded those years with generous and significant service, not letting down in the quality of her work, though in these later months her heart has often been heavy. She leaves upon this community the impress of strong, unselfish, heroic womanhood. Surely the people of God of this community will not fail in any way the children for whom her whole life was a prayer.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon from the Congregational church and were largely attended.

The pastor, Rev. E. W. Cross, D.D. spoke words full of hope and comfort to the mourning friends and relatives. Music was furnished by a quartet composed of Mrs. F. J. Kiesel, Miss Stella Bartlett, Loren Adair and Walter Read. Pall bearers were F. S. Edge, F. F. Clindinin, Dr. A. J. Brock, H. F. McMurray, Fred Adkins and Elmer Bortell. Interment was in Malcom.

## Mrs. Andrew Lunt Passes

The sudden death of Mrs. Andrew Lunt yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, has caused a deep sadness among a large circle of friends. Friday an infection of the throat gave her some trouble. It had increased in seriousness to such an extent that she was taken Sunday morning to St. Francis hospital. The infection grew worse causing her death Monday at 1:30 p.m.

Mrs. Lunt's maiden name was Nettie Louise Eichhorn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Eichhorn. Her age was 35 years old last Friday.

The death of her husband a few months ago left Mrs. Lunt with five children and the farm to care for, and she was doing a noble part in the world's work when her sudden summons came.

Mrs. Lunt leaves five children, the oldest fourteen years old today, the youngest but three.

Funeral services will be held at the Congregational church Wednesday at 1:30 o'clock.
